What is a Community Assessment?



- Describes the people who make up the community
- Reveals community assets and needs
- Identifies environmental factors and resources that might impact library services
- May suggest library goals and outcomes
- Demonstrates the library's understanding of the community to others

Benefits of community assessment

- Learn about residents who don't use the library
- Increase connections with other community organizations and groups
- Better align library services with community needs
- Move toward community-led programs and services

Why do community data research?

- Understand the big picture
- Start to see categories and groups
- Compare circumstances
- Identify trends
- Clarify your scope
- Generate questions



PEST Analysis Framework

- Political
- Economic
- Social-Cultural
- Technological
- Other configurations
 - PESTLE = PEST + Legal + Environmental
 - STEEPLE = PEST + Environmental + Legal + Ethical
 - SLEPT = PEST + Legal



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Data Literacy Tips for Library Staff

- Knowing how the data was gathered and analyzed will help you understand its meaning
- Understanding a few foundational statistical concepts will be all you need most of the time
- Don't rush or make assumptions; take the time to understand what the data says

Understanding Census Bureau Geography



- Census geographies align only with state and county boundaries
- Census geographies can change as part of preparation for the decennial census
- Although data is gathered at the Census Block level, the smallest reported unit is often the Census Block Group

Why walk—or drive—around the community?

- Familiarize yourself with areas you don't frequent
- Learn where community organizations and services are located
- Identify challenges in the physical environment
- Identify and overcome delays in reporting



Community Asset Mapping

Why do it?

- Promotes community involvement
- Recognizes and documents community strengths and existing resources
- Helps identify community networks
- Helps identify others who share your goals

What is included?

- Capacities and abilities of community members
- Physical structures or places
- Businesses that support community
- Associations of community members
- Private, public, and nonprofit organizations
